The following report for the Electoral Reform(ERRE) Committee is for the town hall meeting at Odell Park Lodge Fredericton NB held on Tuesday August 9 2016 from 7 – 9 p.m.

Over forty people gathered for the town hall meeting at Odell Lodge to discuss the government's campaign promise to update our electoral system for the 2019 election. The event featured talks by keynote speaker David Meslin (Every Voter Counts Alliance), Andrew MacLean (Fair Vote Canada), and Simon Ouellette (CUPE).

"Any proportional representation system has flaws, so don't look for a perfect system," explained Mr. Meslin "but they don't come close to the flaws in our current First Past The Post voting system. It is by far the worst system and personally I don't even consider it a system. It makes no attempt to create fair results."


The presentations were followed by the completion of Fair Vote Canada's Questionnaire, which is based on the ERRE's questions. The results of the completed questionnaires are attached.

Polling Questions on Electoral Reform

Developed by Fair Vote Canada, this questionnaire is meant to provide information on citizens' views likely to be of interest to our politicians and the general public. 
- 16. Given a choice between keeping the current First-past-the-Post system, or changing it, what would be your preference?
