Democratic principles and values

1. Did you have a dialogue about the principles and values that underpin Canada's democracy? Yes / No

Yes we did talk about the principles and values of Canadian's democracy. Key values we agreed on were:

- Every voter should have **equal representation** – as best as possible.
- Voting system should be **transparent** – people should be able to vote for who they want and their elected representative should find their direction from citizens they represent
- Parties should receive seats **proportional** to their popular vote
- There should be **civility** in parliament
- Legislation should be developed through a process that

engages the widest **consensus** of thought. **Collaboration** is slower but is capable of long term planning and decisions made are durable.

- A referendum would have the rights of the minority made by vote of majority.

- a. If yes, what were the highlights of the dialogue? b. What principle(s) did participants identify as **most important**? c. What principle(s) did participants identify as least important?

Principle of direct decision making through referendum was not identified as important as complex issues can not be reduced to yes no questions.

There has been enough discussion and study. It is clear our current system is not very democratic. 39% of the vote = 100% of the power. Often the "winner" has less than 50% of the vote (and no power) so FPTP does a poor job of providing local representation.
