Representational voting proposal,

Part of the liberal's election campaign was to establish representation voting within 19 months of forming government. As noble of a concept this is, I am of the opinion it will remain a long failure, without any party ever being able to control the parliament, will have drain on parliament and their resources with hung decisions.

However, I have a proposal. It has gathered me support online and I feel it may be a best of both worlds proposal. I would like to see the proportional voting be applied to representation in the senate. As the checks and balance of our system, it is unfair to be a balance, when it is solely controlled by two parties. The longer a government holds power the more they appoint their buddies and friends and establish more and more control over the senate.

Applying the proportional vote to senate appointment would ensure all parties had a day and representative in the senate, and would never allow one single party to control the senate. Whereas senate in not democratically elected by the people, and would be more appropriate to adjust by voter representation.
