1. Economic Recovery and Growth

Given the current climate of federal and global fiscal restraint, what specific federal measures do you feel are needed for a sustained economic recovery and enhanced economic growth in Canada?

The primary focus for economic recovery and growth needs to be on sustainable energy programs. Continued focus on short-term solutions like coal and oil and (shockingly!) asbestos mining as means of generating jobs means we will all pay the price in years to come, with damaged air and water, and poor health for more and more Canadians. And poor health is costly as we know. I would like to see this government focus on generating jobs and wealth by investing in research and development of clean technologies, and offering incentives to get us off oil. 2. Job Creation

As Canadian companies face pressures resulting from such factors as uncertainty about the U.S. economic recovery, a sovereign debt crisis in Europe, and competition from a number of developed and developing countries, what specific federal actions do you believe should be taken to promote job creation in Canada, including that which occurs as a result of enhanced internal and international trade?

I believe Canadian companies should only have very limited government support. If the business is not competitive, it should make change, or be allowed to fail. We should be investing in education (our school standards are awfully low!) so that young people are better prepared for the work force. I don't think jobs need to be 'created'...there is always work to be done for those who are willing to do it. That said, continuing to cut needed social programs and funding for education is actually taking jobs away, and from where we should have more.

Less than \$10,000 per year...pretty pathetic Mr Harper. Bet you couldn't go to school (i.e. not work) and support your family on that. BUt apparently we're trying to address the challenges of skills shortages. PS> I am now a midwife, helping fill the gap being created by retiring aging family docs and obstetricians.
