Agreed Environment and Climate Change Canada will continue to deliver on obligations under the Species at Risk Act by publishing recovery strategies and management plans. By December 31, 2024, the department will develop a plan indicating the time frames and resources required to advance the completion of recovery strategies, management plans and action plans and publish implementation reports. The department will continue to explore options for multi-species and place-based approaches for recovery planning and action planning, and will consider this as appropriate for implementation reporting. Environment and Climate Change Canada will build the plan to prioritize actions that have the greatest potential conservation outcome, and that will respect the need for meaningful collaboration and engagement with Indigenous communities and groups, stakeholders and other partners.
